

he County Kildare Decade of Commemorations Committee was established by Kildare County Council in 2013 to find new and innovative ways to commemorate the decade from 1913-1923, including the centennials of the 1916 Easter Rising, World War I, the "Spanish" Flu, the War of Independence, the Civil War and the First Dáil. The Committee is committed to ensuring that all commemorations are inclusive while offering an objective exploration of our shared history. Kildare County Council has adopted a strategy that is coordinated with the national programme.

The 1913-1923 period was one of immense change in Ireland; a time of rebellion, war and political upheaval which influenced the socio-economic fabric of the country. A seminal event of the period, World War I became known as the Great War given the scale compared to previous conflicts; it changed the political, economic, social and cultural nature of Europe forever. The lives of 750 Kildare men and three women were lost during or as a result of the war. This book assembles the available biographical information on each of the fatalities.

On the 100th anniversary of the Armistice, 11 November 2018, a civic ceremony took place at 11.00 a.m. at Áras Chill Dara, Devoy Park, Naas. A memorial plaque to the County Kildare war dead was installed at the Clock Tower of the former Naas Barracks, one-time home of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers.

The County Kildare Decade of Commemorations Committee aims to create the legacy of research for future generations. It has already supported hundreds of seminars, publications, artworks, music, lectures, commemorative gardens, films and plays throughout the county. This volume is another keenly anticipated addition to that legacy.

The Committee would like to acknowledge the support of the five Municipal Districts of Athy, Celbridge-Leixlip, Clane-Maynooth, Kildare-Newbridge and Naas; and the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media in delivering the Decade of Centenaries Programme in Co. Kildare.



Introduction

orld War I, which began on 28 July 1914 and ended on 11 November 1918, resulted in over sixteen million military and civilian deaths. At the time, Ireland was part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and service in the British Army had been a tradition for many generations. Around 210,000 Irishmen served in the British Armed Forces during World War I, of whom approximately 30,000 died. This book contains the records of servicemen and some non-combatants who died, and who were born or lived in County Kildare for an extended period of time before the war. While this book does not profess to contain the definitive list of the war dead from the county, it is a substantial contribution towards establishing a final total.

The earlier versions of the list of World War I dead of County Kildare can be better described as casualty lists, as researchers were reliant on contemporary newspaper reports about casualties. Such reports were often premature as many of those listed as killed were subsequently found to be wounded or missing instead. This revised and updated list was compiled by Karel Kiely, James Durney and Mario Corrigan, whose research has revealed that men cited as Kildare born on previous lists were from other parts of Ireland or the United Kingdom. Some were born on or near the county's borders with addresses recorded as in County Kildare, e.g. Ballylinan, Athy, Co. Kildare, or Enfield, Co. Kildare. Others may have been born outside the County Kildare, but spent most of their lives in it.

The individuals listed died while in the service of the armies of Great Britain, Canada, Australia, the United States, New Zealand and India, as well as in the British Merchant Navy, the Royal Air Force, and the Voluntary Aid Detachment. The majority served with the British armed forces and Merchant Navy, while fourteen died serving in the Canadian forces, eleven in the Australian Army, four in the United States Army, and two each in the New Zealand and Indian forces. The final total of County Kildare men who died while serving with the U.S. Army is difficult to establish because soldiers usually gave their current address on enlistment and not their Irish birthplace.

Research carried out by the authors has established that approximately 750 men and three women from County Kildare died between the outbreak of war in August 1914 and the official date of the end of the war as 31 August 1921.

In the compilation of this list of County Kildare war dead, it was decided to include all those whose birth or baptism was registered in the county, including those born to Irish, English, Scottish and Welsh parents. Many children of British or other parentage, whose fathers were serving in the military, often left the county within a few days or weeks of birth. There are a small number of exceptions with regard to the inclusion of those considered by family or local sources to be from County Kildare.

- An individual who spent a considerable portion of their life in the county, or whose family lived in the county before the war, and who are acknowledged by local or family sources as a Kildare person.
- An individual of a known County Kildare family, or whose family had strong Kildare connections, who was born in another county or country.

These casualties may also appear on other county lists. For example, the three Johnston brothers from Newbridge Road, Naas, were all born in Killorglin, County Kerry, but spent most of their lives in County Kildare where two of their siblings were born. Their family burial plot is in St. Corban's Cemetery, Naas. The Johnstons are also included in a list of County Kerry war dead.

The Kildare war dead lie in Flanders, France, Turkey, Africa, India, Britain, and some in the county of their birth. Many of the fallen have no known grave and are commemorated on memorials in military cemeteries, while some are recorded on family graves in County Kildare. Those who did not die in combat, but passed away at home as a result of illness, accident, or suicide, were buried locally. Men who were wounded or contracted diseases during the course of the war, but died after 31 August 1921, were not classed as war dead.

A wide collection of sources was used to verify those stated to be born in County Kildare, athough it was not possible to trace corroborating information in all cases. If the original information about a person's County Kildare birthplace came from reliable or valued sources, it was decided to retain them on the list. These are noted as 'Co. Kildare place of birth unverified'. In cases where no birth record could be located, the details of the baptismal record have been used. Sources can be contradictory in relation to ages, next of kin, date and place of birth. In some cases where an exact record of birth or baptism was not found, a year of birth has been estimated based on other sources. If sources included family information, such as the names and addresses of parents, wives and children, it has been included in this volume. Variations of spelling of surnames has also been noted.

The details provided for each individual in this volume includes the following information when available: service number, except for officers who did not have a number; rank; unit; cause, date and location of death; location of grave or memorial; date of birth or baptism; place of birth; names and address of parents or other next-of-kin; occupation of fathers; place of enlistment and residence. When extra information was available, such as details of their service, it has also been included.

County Kildare was an important centre of the British Army in Ireland, with barracks at Naas, Newbridge, Kildare Town and the Curragh Camp. The presence of the British Army in the county for many generations, ensured that enlistment in the county was above average. When war was declared in 1914 new recruits joined the army at their nearest Regimental Depot or at one of its normal recruiting offices. Naas was the depot for the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, Newbridge was a cavalry barracks, and Kildare Town, an artillery centre. Prior to the war a recruit had a choice over the regiment to which he was assigned; in theory wartime volunteers continued to have a choice over the regiment they joined.

Men might choose a regiment due to its reputation or a family connection with it. Those rejected by one regiment or turned away because of the large numbers enlisting would travel to join another. If a man left his unit or regiment due to injury or sickness, he had no guarantee that he would be posted back to it. This became increasingly common as the war progressed.

Those who had previously served in the army were allowed to re-join up to the age of forty-five. As it was not necessary to produce evidence of age or name, there were many recorded instances of both overage and underage men enlisting. Infantry regiments like the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, cast their net widely when looking for new recruits, despite their local ties. They operated local recruitment centres,

had representation at recruiting centres around the country, as well as at the regimental HQ or depot. This list records the place of residence given by the soldier on enlistment where available.

Men who were army reservists (some of whom had not served since the end of the South African War in 1902) or special reservists (those with very basic training) were called up to bring units up to full strength. Reservists who were too old or unfit for active service remained at home in barracks or depots where they assisted in the training of younger recruits or with the general workings of the service. Some of these, who later died of illness or were killed in accidents, were given the status of war dead.

The sacrifice and suffering of the Irish men and women who took part in World War I remained largely forgotten until recent times. Those from County Kildare have been recorded here together for posterity, adding to previous research carried out locally and nationally on Irish participation in the war.

Curragh Camp late 1800's

Terminology

Died of wounds

The person was not killed outright, but died of wounds received in action at a regimental aid post, casualty clearing station, or in a military hospital.

Killed in action

The person was killed during engagement with the enemy.

Mentioned in Despatches

The person had done something that warranted their name being included in an official account written by a superior officer that was sent to the War Office. The report described the gallant or meritorious action taken in the face of the enemy. This was also published in *The Gazette* and usually included the person's name, rank, number and regiment or unit, but not why they were been recognised. The recipient was entitled to receive a certificate and wear an oak leaf decoration on their dress uniform. Only one such decoration could be worn, even if a person had been mentioned in despatches more than once.



Date of Birth (DOB church)

This is the date of birth that was recorded on the baptismal entry in a parish for the individual. In some cases, a church baptismal register only records a date of baptism and not a date of birth.

Date of Birth (DOB civil)

This is the date of birth recorded on the individual's civil birth record. There can sometimes be discrepancies between the dates of birth recorded in the civil and church records.

Son/daughter of the late

Implies that the parent was deceased at the time of subject's death or when the death was recorded.

Rifleman

This is a rank used instead of private.



Memorials of the Dead

he Imperial War Graves Commission (IWGC) was founded on 21 May 1917 to commemorate the war dead of the previous three years. While the IWGC faced a monumental task, within twenty years of its establishment it had commemorated 580,000 identified and over 180,000 unidentified British Commonwealth dead of the war. In 1960 the IWGC was renamed the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

The principle of the equal treatment of all war dead was a central tenet of the War Graves Commission. Memorials were designed to be permanent and uniform, with no distinction in the shape or size of gravestones on account of the rank or social standing of the deceased. The grave-markers would be upright slabs, not crosses; the cemeteries would have a standard design, with standard symbols and inscriptions. Even unidentified soldiers were to be given individual graves.

France created the concept of the "Unknown Soldier". No exhumation of remains for repatriation was permitted. The fallen were interred and commemorated in a cemetery close to where they had died; those whose relatives could have afforded the cost of repatriation were to be denied in the interests of all.

Every serviceman deemed to be on active service during the period from 4 August 1914 to 31 August 1921 was considered as war dead. Those who died after 31 August 1921 as a result of wounds inflicted or diseases contracted during the course of the war were not classed as war dead.

While the majority of the Co. Kildare war dead lie in cemeteries in France and Belgium, there are some in Turkey, Palestine, Malta and elsewhere. The war graves and memorials in churches and schools, within Co. Kildare have been photographed as part of this World War I commemorative project, by Seán Sourke, commissioned by the County Kildare Decade of Commemorations Committee.

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) is responsible for the commemoration of personnel who died between those dates whilst serving in a Commonwealth military force or specified auxiliary organisation, including any personnel who died after their discharge, if their death was caused by their wartime service. Its work continues to this day with the ongoing discovery and DNA identification of remains on many former battlefields, allowing the burial or re-burial of many men previously 'known onto God.'

World War I Timeline

1914

- **28 June.** Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria assassinated in Sarajevo.
- **28 July.** Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia. Russia mobilised.
- 1-3 August. Germany declared war on Russia; signed treaty with Ottoman Empire; invaded Luxembourg and declared war on France.
- **4 August.** Germany invaded Belgium; Britain declared war on Germany.
- 5-12 August. The Ottoman Empire closed the Dardanelles Straits. Austria-Hungary declared war on Russia. Serbia declared war on Germany. The British Expeditionary Force (BEF) and France. Britain and France declared war on Austria-Hungary.
- **23 August.** Battle of Mons; first contact between British and German armies.
- 24 August-28 September.
 BEF Great Retreat to the River
 Marne. Several rearguard
 actions, including
 the Battle of Le Cateau
 (26 August), the Étreux
 rearguard action (27 August)
 and the action at Néry
 (1 September).
- **26th August.** First Co. Kildare born fatality; Private Joseph Mary Manning, Royal Munster Fusiliers, 2nd Battalion. Killed in action, France.
- **28 August.** British Royal Navy wins the First Battle of Heligoland Bight, North Sea.
- **5-28 September.** First Battle of the Marne; German advance on Paris halted. First Battle of the Aisne.
- 12 October-22 November. First Battle of Messines and the First Battle of Ypres. Stalemate as both sides dug trenches from the North Sea to the Swiss frontier.

29 October-5 November.

The Ottoman Empire attacked the Russian Black Sea coast. Russia declared war on the Ottoman Empire. Britain began the naval blockade of German ports. France and Britain declared war on the Ottoman Empire.

1915

- 19 February. British and French attacked the Dardanelles Straits; beginning of the Gallipoli Campaign.
- **22 April-25 May.** Second Battle of Ypres. First use of poison gas by Germans.
- 25 April-2 May. Allied forces landed on the Gallipoli peninsula, at Anzac Cove and Cape Helles. Dublin and Munster Fusiliers suffer heavy casualties.

 14 Kildaremen killed.
- **7 May.** British liner Lusitania sunk by German U-boat off the coast of Ireland.
- **6-15 August.** Allies, including 10th (Irish) Division, landed at Suvla Bay, Gallipoli.
- **25-28 September.** Battle of Loos. First use of poison gas by British.
- **27 October.** French army landed in Salonika.
- **6-12 December.** Battle of Kosturino; Bulgarian Army forced a complete withdrawal of Allied forces from Serbia.

1916

- **9 January.** End of Gallipoli Campaign; Turkish victory; Allied troops evacuated.
- **1 March.** Germany resumed unrestricted submarine warfare.
- **24-29 April.** Easter Rising in Dublin and some parts of the country.
- **27-29 April.** Gas attacks at Hulluch; 16th Irish Division badly affected. Nine Kildaremen killed.
- **10 May.** Germany suspended unrestricted submarine warfare.
- **31 May-1 June.** Naval Battle of Jutland, a British tactical victory.
- 1 July. The Battle of the Somme; 20,000 British casualties incurred on the first day with little gain. Nine Kildaremen died that day; over thirty die in the month of July.
- **3-6 September.**Battle of Guillemont.
 Lt. John V. Holland (Athy) won the Victoria Cross.
- **9 September.** 16th Irish Division captured village of Ginchy.
- **15-28 September.** Battle of Flers-Courcelette; British used tanks for the first time in history. Battle of Thiepval Ridge.
- **18 November.** End of the Battle of the Somme.



917

- **1 February.** Germany again resumed unrestricted submarine warfare.
- **23 February-5 April.** Germans withdrew to the Hindenburg Line.
- **15 March.** Czar Nicholas II abdicated. Provisional government in Russia.
- **6-7 April.** United States declared war on Germany and Austria-Hungary.
- **9 April-16 May.** Battle of Arras. Canadians captured Vimy Ridge.
- **7-14 June.** Second Battle of Messines, the British exploded nineteen deep mines and recaptured Messines Ridge.
- **25 June.** First American troops landed in France.
- **31 July-2 August.** Opening phase of the Third Battle of Ypres.
- 16-18 August. Battle of Langemarck, the second Anglo-French attack of the Third Battle of Ypres; twenty-three Kildaremen died in the August battles.
- **20-27 September.** Battle of the Menin Road Ridge; Battle of Polygon Wood.
- **12 October** First Battle of Passchendaele.
- **26 October-10 November.** Second Battle of Passchendaele (Last phase of the Third Battle of Ypres).
- **1-2 November.** 10th Irish Division involved in Third Battle of Gaza.
- **7 November.** The Russian Revolution begins.



1918

- **3 March.** Peace Treaty of Brest-Litovsk ended Russia's involvement in the war.
- **4 March.** First recorded instance of influenza at US Army base in Kansas.
- 21 March. First day of the German Spring Offensive. Twenty-one Kildaremen killed on that first day. Thirteen more Kildaremen killed by the end of the week.
- **21-23 March.** Battle of St. Quentin.
- **9-29 April**. Second phase of the Spring Offensive (Battle of the Lys).
- 16 April. British House of Commons passed the Military Service Act. Faced with staunch opposition the government did not enforce conscription in Ireland.
- **27 May-6 June.** Third Battle of the Aisne. The Germans got within 50km of Paris.
- **1-26 June.** Battle of Belleau Wood involved US Army and Marines. Fourth phase of the German Spring Offensive.

- **15 July-6 August.** Second Battle of the Marne; last German offensive.
- **13 July.** Athy has the first recorded instance of the Great Flu in Co. Kildare
- 8 August-11 November. Allies launched the Hundred Days Offensive. Battle of the Hindenburg Line. Meuse-Argonne Offensive, the last campaign of World War I.
- **10 October**Sinking of the RMS Leinster by German submarine in the Irish Sea.
- **30 October.** The Ottoman Empire signed the Armistice of Mudros; ended hostilities between Turkey and the Allies. At least fifteen Kildaremen die on the Western Front in October.
- **9 November.** Kaiser William II abdicated and a republic proclaimed in Germany.
- 10 November. Able Seaman Robert Williamson (Celbridge), last Kildareman to die in the war, killed when the minesweeper Ascot was sunk off the coast of Scotland.
- 11 November. At 6 a.m. Germany signed the Armistice of Compiègne. End of fighting between Germany and the Allies at 11 a.m.

Cyril was killed leading his men into action near the communes of Vis-en-Artois and Haucourt. Cissie continued to work as an actress in New York thoughout the 1920s. She later moved back to England, working as a choreographer; she never remarried and died in Sussex, England on 22 April 1966.

He was also commemorated in 1915 with the unveiling of a stained glass window at Ballymore Parish Church, Co. Kildare, with the inscription 'In loving memory of Hubert Crichton, Major, Irish Guards, killed in rearguard action at

Villers Cotret, (sic) France,

September 1st, 1914.'








Helles Memorial, Turkey



The War Office and the request of his relatives—had the remains sent home and laid in their last resting place beside the peaceful little village of Ballymore-Enistace far from the dia of battle. As the sad cortege reached the outskirts of the village the solemn pealing of the chapel bell announced its arrival, and the villagers flocked to pay a last mark of respect. The Rev. Father O'Brien. 


Wookey, Frederick Maurice

Born 1 Church Avenue, Rathmines, Dublin, 1 July 1887. Son of Frederick Wookey (mill owner and Justice of the Peace) and Fanny McCalman, Weston Lodge, Leixlip, Co. Kildare.

Supplementary information: Enlisted: Dublin. His family was living in Leixlip from at least 1885. Frederick left the family firm Salmon Leap Mills of which he was a director and joined the Officers' Training Corps on 6 August 1914. He was wounded while leading his company at St. Eloi, Belgium on 15 March 1915. His mother Fanny sold the family home when her husband died in July 1918. She planned to move back to England but was drowned following the sinking of RMS Leinster on 10 October 1918.

Son of Samuel Wray (steward) and Elizabeth Cook, later of Woodville, Naas, Co. Kildare; husband of Ellen Wray, 'Rayville,' Undercliffe Road, Undercliffe, New South Wales, Australia.

Cemetery Extension, Somme, France.

Supplementary information: Enlisted: Sports Ground, Sydney, New South Wales, Australia, 1 May 1916. Served with the Western Province Cape Mounted Rifles during the South African War. Joined the Durban Light Infantry and took part in West Africa campaign. His parents were listed in the 1901 and 1911 Census at Downings South, Prosperous, Co. Kildare. Two of his siblings were born in Co. Kildare.

Wright, James

Service No. 17956. Rifleman, Royal Irish Rifles, 1st Battalion. Killed in action, France, 7 March 1917. Age 26. Born Ballymore Eustace, Co. Kildare, 20 July 1890. Son of James Wright (tailor) and Kate Curley.

Grave or Memorial Reference: VIII. D. 22, Fins New British Cemetery, Sorel-le-Grand, Somme, France.

Supplementary information: Enlisted: Belfast, 10 October 1914. Residence: Dublin. By 1911 his father, a widower, and his sister Mary, were living at 13 Chamber Street, Dublin.

Wright, Peter Hollingsworth



DEMOBILISATION.

OUT-OF-WORK PAY FOR EX-SERVICE MEN.

GRADUAL DISCHARGE.

Dr. Addison, Minister of Reconstruction, speaking in the House of Commons on Tuesday night, said there would be about one million people who would require to change their occupation on the cessation of war manufacture, of which rather more than one-half would be men. The Government had decided to make provision for such unemployment as might occur during the coming months, its scheme embracing both civil workers and ex-service men. For civil workers the scheme would be in operation for six months from a date to be appointed, during which the maximum period for which donation might be paid to any individual would be thirteen weeks. regards ex-service men, the soldier would be entitled to out-of-work donation during the twelve months following his demobilisation.

THE BENEFIT SCHEME.

For a maximum period not exceeding 26 weeks the rates of benefit to adults would be:—24s. per week for men; 20s. per week for women; 6s. for the first dependent child under 15s; 3s. for each succeeding dependent child. Juveniles (over 15 and under 18 years of age), 12s. per week for boys and 10s. per week for girls.

The out-of-work donation payable to partially disabled men in receipt of pensions. would be additional to their pensions, and no deductions would be made in respect of

such pensions.

Payment of contributions under the existing compulsory schome of unemployment insurance would continue, but workpeople would not be allowed to draw simul-

taneously under both schemes.

As to the general body of soldiers, the general rule would be that men who had places waiting for them would return before those who had no definite prospects. The Ministry of Labour was preparing a priority list of industrial groups in the order of their national importance. Within each group preference would be given to married men over single men, and a certain proportion of each draft would consistof men with a long period of service.

THE PROCESS OF DEMOBILISATION.

Soldiers returning home would receive a cash payment. They would be entitled to 28 days' furlough, for which they would receive pay and ration allowance, and the separation allowance would be continued. The armies at home and abroad would be demolulised by equal numbers daily. The process of demobilisation would be carried out at a rapid rate.

The Government had accepted the general principle that from the beginning of deubobilisation and for a year after, permanent appointments in the Civil Service should be reserved for ex-officers and exsoldiers, though the rule would not be rigidly applied to the exclusion of candi-dates with special qualifications.



Borrowes, Kildare Henry

Midshipman, HMS *Queen Mary*. Died North Sea, 31 May 1916. Age 16. Born 11 March 1900, Bartra, Eglington Road, Dublin. Son of Eustace Borrowes (land agent) and Winifred Royse, later of 18 Warwick Villas, Leeson Park, Dublin.

Grave or Memorial Reference: Portsmouth Naval Memorial, England and St. John's Church, Ballymore Eustace, Co. Kildare. Supplementary information: Nephew of Mrs. Johnston, Athy, Co. Kildare, (wife of Archdeacon Johnston), and of Sir Kildare Borrowes, Barretstown Castle, Ballymore Eustace, Co. Kildare. There is a memorial in Ballymore Eustace Church of Ireland comprised of two stained glass windows dedicated to Kildare Henry Borrowes and his cousin Walter Borrowes who died 7 January 1915 when his submarine sank in the English Channel.

Buffery, Thomas (alias Dunne, John)

Service No. 8851. Private, Royal Warwickshire Regiment, 1st Battalion. Killed in action, France, 25 December 1915. Reported born Monasterevin, Co. Kildare. Son of Thomas Buffery, 17 The Firs, Armoury Road, Birmingham, England.

Grave or Memorial Reference: III. F. 2, Sucrerie Military

Cemetery, Colincamps, Somme, France.

Supplementary information: Enlisted: Naas, Co. Kildare. Residence: Birmingham. His place of birth is unverified. On the Register of Soldiers' Effects he was recorded as John Dunne, alias Thomas Buffery, and his next of kin was his father, Thomas Buffery.

Clements, William Hunter

Second Lieutenant. Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, 11th Battalion. Killed in action (drowned in a shell-crater), Belgium, 16 August 1917. Age 24. Born Ballycreene, Lisburn, Co. Down, 2 July 1893. Son of Andrew Clements (teacher) and Margaret Rutherford. Grave or Memorial Reference: XXV. F. 16. New Irish Farm Cemetery, West Flanders, Belgium and Naas Presbyterian Church graveyard.

Supplementary information: Originally reported as born Naas, Co. Kildare, he had lived and worked as a bank clerk in Naas after 1911. Parents later recorded as Andrew Clements, LL.D., and Margaret B. Clements, of 28 Knutsford Drive, Cliftonville, Belfast, Co. Antrim.

Conlon, Edward

Service No. 35039. Private, Leinster Regiment, 3rd Battalion. Died at sea, HMS Leinster, 10 October 1918. Born Clonmore, King's Co., 22 October 1899. Son of Patrick Conlon (labourer) and Kate Blong, later of Ballynoland Road, Brackna, Rathangan, Co. Kildare.

Grave or Memorial reference: RC 599, Grangegorman Military Cemetery, Dublin.

Supplementary information: Edward was living with his parents in the household of his aunt, Bridget Quinn, Cloncassen, Bracknagh in 1901 and the household of his grandmother, Mary Anne Blong, Clonmore, Bracknagh in 1911.

Kelly, Gilbert Grace 'Bertie'

Service No. 10/2986. Private, Wellington Regiment, 7th Infantry Battalion, New Zealand Expeditionary Force. Killed in action, France, 26 September 1916. Age 25. Born Green Villa, Maryborough, Queen's Co., 10 September 1891. Son of Gilbert Kelly (Clerk of the Crown and Peace, Queen's Co.) and Rachel Victoria Wilson.

Grave or Memorial Reference: Caterpillar Valley (New Zealand) Memorial, Somme, France.

Supplementary information: Residence: Barrett's Hotel, Wellington, New Zealand. His mother's address was later recorded as The Abbey, Athy, Co. Kildare and 'Lennox Lea', Charlton Drive, Sale, Manchester, England. She was listed in the 1911. Census in the household of Dr. Jeremiah O'Neill, J.P., Emily Square, Athy, as an aunt; her occupation was school attendance officer. Gilbert's two brothers also served in the war.

Leeburn, Hugh Giffin

Service No. 29474. Private, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, 10th Battalion. Killed in action, France, 23 March 1918. Born Collinward, Belfast, Co. Antrim, 23 September 1889. Age 28. Son of Parker Leeburn (labourer/gardener) and Janet Courtney. Grave or Memorial Reference: Panel 79 and 80, Pozières Memorial, Somme, France.

Supplementary information: Married Elizabeth Cronly, Catholic Church, Carbury, Co. Kildare, on 22 November 1915. Her family was from Ticknevin. His address on his marriage record was Maynooth, Co. Kildare. He had previously worked at Powerscourt Demesne, Co. Wicklow, as a gardener (1911).

McDonnell, Martin Joseph

Second Lieutenant. Royal Irish Rifles, 2nd Battalion. Died of wounds, France, 24 January 1917. Age 24. Born Glencoe, Dunmore, Co. Galway, 2 July 1892. Son of Farrell McDonnell (gentleman) and Ina McDonogh.

Grave or Memorial Reference: III. A. 194, Bailleul Communal

Cemetery Extension, Nord, France.

Supplementary information: Residence: Newpark House, Kilmeague, Co. Kildare. Decoration, Military Medal. His maternal grandfather, Francis Joseph McDonagh, was a doctor who was living at Newpark House, Kilmeague, Co. Kildare, in 1901 and 1911. His father died at Newpark in 1912 and his mother remarried in 1915 to George Cashel.

McLeod, Charles Johnston

Service No. 418484. Private, Canadian Infantry, 2nd Battalion. Killed in action, Belgium, 29 February 1916. Age 30. Born Laggan, Inverness, Scotland, 11 March 1886. Son of Lachlan McLeod (carter) and Ann Stewart; husband of Charlotte McLeod, 929 Dralet St., Montréal, Québec, Canada, and later of Woodbine Cottage, Kilgowan, Kilcullen, Co. Kildare.

Grave or Memorial Reference: I. H. 6, Lindenhoek Chalet Military Cemetery, Belgium and Yellow Bog Church, Kilcullen,

Roll of Honour.

Supplementary information: Enlisted: Montréal, 18 March 1915. His wife Charlotte, née Noble, was born at Kilgowan, Kilcullen, in 1886, daughter of Edward Noble (farmer) and Elizabeth Hill. Charles and Charlotte were married in Montréal on 23 September 1909. Charlotte remarried to Thomas Hunter in Baltinglass, Co. Wicklow in 1922.

Meredith, Evelyn Rice

Service No. 87208. Driver, Canadian Field Artillery, 5th Brigade, 20th Battery. Died of pneumonia, Moore Barracks Hospital, Shorncliffe, Kent, England, 6 January 1916. Age 30. Born Rosenallis, Queen's Co., 21 January 1883 (according to his attestation record). Son of Rice Meredith and Eveline Margaret Johnson; husband of Annie Madeleine Meredith, née Brooks, 719 15th Street North, Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada.

Grave or Memorial Reference: O. 335, Shorncliffe Military

Cemetery, Kent.

Supplementary information: Enlisted: Lethbridge, Alberta, 28 December 1914. His name was recorded as Edward Stanley Meredith on his enlistment papers. He had previously served in South Africa. In the Kildare RC parish registers there is a baptismal record for Evelyn Rice Meredith, Rathbride House, The Curragh, Co. Kildare, on 18 May 1883, son of John Meredith and Evelyn Johnson, a convert to Catholicism. According to family information he was born at Derrylough, Queen's Co., 19 January 1883; his father, Rice Meredith, was a well-known racehorse breeder and trainer, who moved to the Curragh from Derrylough, and later to Rathbride.

Mullen, James

Service No. 12362. Corporal, 14th (King's) Hussars, Mediterranean Expeditionary Force. Died Mesopotamia, 10 October 1918. Age 30. Born Dollanstown, Co. Meath, 10 May 1888. Son of James Mullen (labourer) and Annie McCormack.

Kildare. His mother's address was recorded as Rodanstown, Kilcock, Co. Kildare, on military records. Brother of Patrick Mullen, No. 16261, died France, 27 April 1916.

Mullen, Patrick

Stanley, Leonard Victor

Supplementary information: Twice Mentioned in Despatches. Only son of Brigadier General Francis Waldron, C.B., R.H., who lived for many years at Melitta Lodge, was associated with the Turf Club, and died at Melitta Lodge in 1932 aged 78. Ferdy, a pioneer of military aviation, joined the Royal Flying Corps in 1913, and was the first to reach Montrose Air Station in the first British military flight to Scotland that year. His wife gave birth to their daughter Patricia two months before his death.





Doran, Coroban's Lone, whose husband, Private John Doran, Dahlin Fusiliers, is a prisoner in Germany, has asked us to publish the following, written by her brother-in-law, Private Thomas Doran, 1st Batte. R.D.F. (formerly of the Harbour, Nass), who is now in Exeter recovering from wounds received in the Dardanelles:—

STORMING OF THE DARDANELLES.

We talk of Irish regiments, no wonder

We talk of Irish regiments, no wonder why we do.

The Dublins and the Munsters, you've heard about those two;

You can see by many papers how Irish blood it tells

The way those famous regiments fought at the Dardanelles.

On the 25th of April, when we did make

On the 25th of April, when we did make a start,
We were singing "Tipperary," a song that reached our hearts;
The ships were packed with khaki lads, such spirits they did show
To the ory "Are we downhearted?" we quickly answered "No."

We get then into our small beats, this
way we were to land,
Then every "Toempy" could be seen with
a "Woodbine" in his hand,
They were boys from Tipperary, from Cork
and County Clare,
And the boys from County Dublin and the
"Short Grass," that's Kildare.

The Turks they were prepared for us, as one and all could tell.

For about one thousand yards from land we were met with shot and shell;

There were bodies floating through the sea and handreds on the send,

But the Turks they suffered terribly when we fought them on the land.

Those who got bedly wounded were wishing for the night, came our stretcher boys had lots of work to start,
Collecting bodies, logs and arms, the sight near broke their heart.

The Turks were then retreating, their numbers lost were large;
Our officers say "Dublins! we'll have a bayonet charge,"
The charge was done, the Turks they rus, our lads in ringing cheers,
I can't forget those Irish boys—the Dublin Fusiliers.

Before I go, I tell you, be proud and give three cheers For those brave fighting Irishmen—the Dublin Fusiliers.


