Time for Healing



Victoria Sponge with strawberries

Ingredients

Serves 4 people.

2 tbsp strawberry jam

110 ml Cream whipped

Strawberries

300g caster sugar

5 large fresh eggs

300g self-raising flour

300g butter

Topping

Icing sugar, strawberries

Method

- Preheat the oven to 180 degrees C/ gas mark 4
- Soften the butter and beat in a large mixing bowl with the sugar
- 3. When this mixture is creamy and fluffy add in the eggs and the flour
- 4. If you find the mixture is a little tight you can add a dessert spoon of milk to loosen it up.
- 5. Transfer to two 8 inch tins
- Bake for 25-30 minutes or until a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Allow to cool.
- 7. Spread some of the strawberry jam on both sponges.
- 8. Fill the centre of the cake with freshly whipped cream and sliced strawberries.
- 9. Dust with some icing sugar and decorate with some sliced strawberries.
