I took her up on her offer as I am not very domesticated so I needed badly to brush up on my kitchen skills. On my first day Kate asked me to assist in making an apple crumble. We had over thirty five down for lunch so I had to chop up ten cooking apples which were put into a saucepan and boiled for ten minutes adding brown sugar in the process. She then showed me how to make the crumble with the ingredients such as flour, sugar, butter and cinnamon which we needled to make the crumble. We then poured the cooked apple into a dish and added the crumble and put into the oven for 20-25 minutes. Most of the members complimented me on the finished product.

The next day there was a mixed grill on the menu and we had to make the home made chunky chips. Philip peeled all the potatoes and he showed how we cut them up and this took us the best part of an hour because there were 35 in for dinner that day. Tips on Cooking For One

Get into the habit of spending a few minutes planning your meals and making a shopping list. When you are cooking a main meal (casserole, stew, curry or pasta dishes) make a few extra portions which can be frozen for another day.

Bread, Cereals and Potatoes:

- Buy smaller loaves of bread to prevent waste and freeze whats over for another day.
 Crackers and crispbread will stay fresh for a few weeks in an airtight container.
- Part-baked rolls can be frozen and baked when needed.
- Rice and pasta can be stored for a long time.
- Buy baby potatoes rather than a large bag.



Fruit and Vegetables:

- Frozen vegetables are nutritious with no waste as you can use only what you need.
- Buy vegetables and fruit that are in season as they are cheaper.



Milk Cheese and Yogurt:

- Grated cheese freezes very well and you can use just what you need straight from the freezer.
- Buy smaller cartons of milk may help avoid waste.
- Check the use by date on yoghurts. Generally they can be stored in the fridge for at least two weeks giving you plenty of time to use them up.

Meat, Fish, Eggs, Peas and Beans:

- When cooking meat or chicken, cook a little extra for a sandwich the next day.
- Tins of fish and small tins of peas and beans make very nutritious and economical meals.
